Innovative Plan Rescues 33 Dogs

Ripley County, June & July

In a somewhat unusual case, property owners themselves called the Humane Society of Missouri Animal Cruelty Hot Line. They were overwhelmed by dogs being "dropped off" to fend for themselves and needed our help.

ACT investigators discovered this rescue would not be as easy as merely driving to the site and loading animals onto our climate-controlled rescue trailer.

Three obstacles had to be overcome.

First, the 20 acres where the animals roamed were not accessible by road. Second, a creek running across one end was too deep for HSMO's 30' long, low slung trailer to cross.

And third, the dogs were very skittish and they were scattered throughout the property. In most cases rescuers can coax dogs into crates or carry them out, but not this time

ACT team members solved the issues by building a 25-foot-square kennel on-site and supplied dog food for bait. The owners gradually contained a final count of 33 dogs.

With their four-wheel-drive trucks, animal cruelty investigators transferred the strays to two large rescue trailers located a mile away (the nearest available site).

"The dumped animals had hair loss, long nails, bad teeth and other signs of neglect," said Mike Perkins, director of HSMO's Animal Cruelty Task Force.
"Dropping off a dog to fend for itself is sentencing it to death by starvation, predator attack or automobile impact," he added.

"The project required many hours of planning and multiple trips to the property to set up for the final day of rescue," praised Kathy Warnick, president of the Humane Society of Missouri. "Kudos to team members Mike Little, Mike Langford, Carmen Skelly, Jessica Crampton, Melanie O'Connor and Mike Perkins for this innovative solution to help not only the animals but the people, too."

Hoarder Kept Dogs in Filth

Newton County, March 31

A tip from a concerned citizen led to the rescue of 28 dogs from a hoarder who kept them on a waste-filled, trash-and debris-strewn property and in an abandoned, dilapidated trailer.

The dogs were so neglected that it was difficult to determine their exact breeds. Most of the dogs had severe hair loss and were constantly scratching due to an intense burning, itchy skin irritation.

"Hoarding cases are so sad," commented Kathy Warnick, president of the Humane Society of Missouri. "The hoarders do not appear to realize they are harming animals by accumulating so many and not being able to properly care for them." The owner agreed to voluntarily surrender the dogs to the Humane Society where they were immediately transported to headquarters to be examined, treated and made ready for loving homes.

"Our experience tells us that, unfortunately, people in this situation will continue to acquire animals until they receive court-ordered, professional intervention and treatment," said Warnick. "Therefore, we presented the results of our investigation in this case and recommended prosecution to Newton County officials."

RESCUE UPDATE

Second Chances for Heartworm-Infested Dogs

Humane Society volunteer foster parents were crucial to saving the lives of many heartworm-infested dogs rescued from a distressed animal shelter in the state of Louisiana.



March flooding and April storms severely damaged the shelter in northern Louisiana, forcing it to close. The Humane Society of Missouri accepted all of its 101 dogs. Unfortunately, 40 of them tested positive for heartworm disease.

Heartworm disease is spread through the bite of an infected mosquito. Prevention is as easy as monthly heartworm medication. Treatment is tedious, requiring eight weeks of diligent care. Untreated, the dog will die.

Foster volunteers stepped up for the dogs, welcoming them into their homes for eight weeks. Treatment begins with an injection, after which the dog must rest for a month. It can be difficult to keep a dog from jumping and running, but physical exertion increases the rate of damage in the heart and lungs.

"It was as hard on us as it was the dogs, to keep them quiet," said one foster parent Linda Giese. "We took Fred in the yard on a leash to keep him from running. And when he carried a toy in his mouth, we had to fight the urge to throw it for him."

After the first month, volunteers and dogs made two more trips to the shelter for injections, followed by four more weeks of low-impact overeign

"A lot of love and care was given to these dogs by our volunteers," praised Sue Alkire, manager of the Macklind center's foster program. Three of the dogs were adopted by their foster families, she added.

"Foster Program volunteers were crucial to saving these dogs," said Dr. Mark Wright, HSMO's director of shelter medicine. "One thing we noticed about this group of dogs was how friendly they were. They deserved the special attention HSMO staff and foster parents gave them. We are very happy they are now healthy in loving homes in their new state of Missouri."

8-week foster turns permanent

Although Linda Giese was a long-term volunteer, she and her husband William (pictured above) had never been foster parents. When the shelter needed help with heartworm-positive dogs, she asked for one dog in particular: Fred.

The couple had said goodbye to both their dogs the previous year and they were looking for a new buddy. Linda volunteers once a week with all the dogs, but she had yet to feel a bond with any new dog. Then Fred fixed his gaze on her.

"It was the way he looked at me. I fell in love. When I told my husband I wanted to foster him, he predicted we would keep him," laughed Linda. "We would have to give him up, though, if he did not pass our 'Feline Test'. We have three cats."

During his eight weeks of treatment, Fred and the cats were simpatico. Now Fred the foster is forever home.

Thoroughbred's Fateful Trip

In 1987, a Thoroughbred was born and tattooed with his unique ID number. The racehorse never raced, living mostly in obscurity.

In his 19th year, with ribs showing and bowed tendons on his front legs, the horse now called Stan was loaded on a truck with 41 other horses headed for a slaughterhouse. Tragically, the trailer overturned on Interstate 44 near Sullivan, Mo. Stan waited in the trailer for seven hours while dozens of trained rescue volunteers worked diligently to save as many of the mangled, injured equines as they could. For the next two years Stan recovered at Longmeadow Rescue Ranch and waited for his perfect forever home.

In 2008, touched by Stan's ordeal, Emily Grady Jolliff took the long-legged beauty home.

"We hit it off immediately, but he was wary of other individuals," said Jolliff. "Over time Stan became friendlier with both people and other horses. Where he was once a bit standoff-ish, he now wants everyone's attention."

Soon after arriving in his new barn, Stan figured out how to open the top of his stall's Dutch windows. Every morning between 5 and 6 a.m. Stan stuck his head outside to neigh for breakfast and turnout.


"We always have to be careful about closing the stalls and barn doors as he has a knack for getting those open as well," added Jolliff. "Stan has made fast friends with our farrier, who drives his truck into the field with his tools in the truck bed. Stan roots through the truck bed to find anything he can pick up and carry off or throw around. The most common items he goes after are the farrier's hat (generally while he's wearing it), sunglasses, water bottle, and the occasional tool."

Jolliff rode Stan regularly the first few years but now he is a full-time relaxer. When Jolliff arrives, Stan trots over to her for hugs and conversation. "Our vet said that with Stan's good health he has many more years to live. I think he would like to be considered 29 years young, rather than the old guy out on retirement.



Scars Remain but Life Is Good

A neighbor heard the horse's screams as it lay on its side being dragged down a roughly paved road behind a pickup truck. The Sheriff seized the two-year-old bay



and asked Longmeadow Rescue Ranch to take custody. That was July of 2008. In December, the former owner pled guilty to one count of felony animal abuse.

It took three months for Mason's severe injuries to heal but the scars are there for good. Everyone who knew Mason's story hoped he would land in clover when he went to his forever home.

Did he ever! Mason was adopted in 2009 by lifelong horse lover Joe Mathews. Now ten years old, the gelding has done nothing but hang out in the 60-acre pasture he shares with other rescued or retired horses for the past seven years.

"He's a cut up, good guy," said Mathews. "We don't plan to ride him, just let him be. He's been through a lot."

Basset on the Brink

Basset Hound Watson breathed a sigh of relief when he went to his forever home two years ago.

It is no exaggeration to state that Watson and his littermates were on the brink of death, gasping for every breath. Three of the litter of 13 had already died when an inspector with the Missouri Department of Agriculture ordered the breeder to turn the pups over to the Humane Society.

"The puppies were so ill we weren't sure they'd even survive the trip to St. Louis," said Mike Perkins, ACT director. Saving the dogs took round-the-clock care from the staff and volunteers but eventually the puppies went to forever homes.

For Watson, that's ancient history. He's too busy now getting into mischief such as shredding cardboard toilet paper rolls.

"When we go to the lake, we have to keep a close look out," said adopter Daniel Dexter. "If he finds a scent, he's off. The body follows the nose." Watson loves walks, people and other dogs. "But he doesn't like car rides," Dexter added.

Marshall the Miracle Dog

When the Animal Cruelty Task Force rescued Marshall from a hoarder in 2010, multiple wounds on his body indicated he had been viciously attacked by other dogs. A bloody, gaping wound covered the left side of his head and one leg had to be amputated. It seemed a miracle he had survived.



Throughout his ordeal, his tail never stopped wagging. In

2011, Marshall left the shelter for a home free of danger and full of love. He has his own book and movie, *Marshall*, *the Miracle Dog*; and his own anti-bullying campaign.

"When I saw his video online, I just had to have him," said Marshall's adopter Cyndi Willenbrock, who did not know the dog's history when she was smitten. "When I heard what he had suffered I could relate because I was also victim of bullying."

Willenbrock, familiar with character education programs, developed an anti-bullying program tied to Marshall's story. Designed for students, the program received a tremendous boost in August when the National 4-H clubs licensed it for use with its six million youth nationwide.

In his early days with Willenbrock, Marshall had frequent nightmares. Now when he dreams, his tail wags just as it did when he was being healed at the Humane Society of Missouri.





Rescued from a Life of Misery

In 2009, a multi-state raid on dog fighting criminal operations brought 500 horribly mistreated animals to safety. The Humane Society of Missouri played a leading role in what turned out to be the largest dog fighting raid and rescue in U.S. history.

The Humane Society coordinated with more than a dozen rescue groups that have expertise with so-called "Bully Breeds." Hundreds of the rescued dogs, mostly American Pit Bull Terriers, found forever homes all across the U.S.A.



Super Trooper is Still a Star

Four years ago, a puppy's horrifying ordeal touched pet lovers around the world. The poor guy was dragged down a major highway tied to the back of a truck. (The driver was unaware of the pup's presence and the perpetrator was brought to justice.)

It was unclear the first few days whether or not he would live. But he pulled through multiple surgeries and a long recovery, earning his name "Trooper."

Today the dog who touched the world has everything he needs from his best friend Greg Weible. Weible works from home so Trooper has the constant personal presence that he also received during his year-long stay at the Humane Society. Daily hikes and walks help drain his high energy and give him social opportunities.

"People sometimes ask about the scars and I tell them about all the other animals in need, so he's become an HSMO ambassador," said Weible.

At home, Trooper spends hours in his big back yard, chasing bugs, frogs and squirrels. Indoors, he curls up on his couch for a petting session, finishing up with a big contented sigh. The affection is reciprocal. Added Weible, "Sometimes I need a Trooper hug!"

Trooper has his own book Facebook page (Team Trooper), updated weekly. "Trooper is very happy," reported Weible. "We're both very happy."

Tortured with a Rubber Band

The young calico cat arrived at the Humane Society of Missouri with something embedded in her neck. It turned out to be a rubber band, placed there so long ago it had painfully fused to the skin. After surgery and treatment against infection, she quickly healed and was ready for adoption just two weeks later.

"There was just something about Miss Catty's face when I saw her online," said Kila Chambers, a first-time adopter. "And when I went to see her, she got right in my lap and I knew she was the one."

Because the rubber band constricted her vocal cords, Miss Catty was unable to meow. "It was more like a bird chirp," said Chambers. Happily, the cat regained her voice within the next few months. "She's such a joy. I laugh because she has lots of toys, but prefers the cheapest kind—a cardboard box," Chambers added that Miss Catty spends hours on top of a closed box or insidean open one.

Miss Catty goes to work with her adopter, where she is a favorite among clients waiting for appointments. It means a car ride, but so far there've been no complaints—neither chirps nor meows.

She loves sharing the shelter animals' individual stories of rehabilitation and it warms her heart when she reads her "fan mail" (thank you cards) from young visitors. It's clear from the cards, that the children absorbed her messages, i.e. the importance of spaying and neutering or how to interpret animal body language.



"As human beings and valuable community members, children of all ages have the ability to make a positive impact on our world," she concluded.

Married for 58 years, Lois and George have two sons, six grandsons and five other young men "who are very special to us," said George. "We have been blessed in so many ways," he added. "The Humane Society is one of our means of returning some of those blessings."


Playtime for Shelter Dogs





Dorie will be greatly missed by all who knew and loved her.
