HSMO Addresses Stray Animal Problem in St. Louis City

"HSMO will provide free spay/neuter surgery to pet owners in the City of St. Louis." Some HSMO supporters may remember the tragic incident 10 years ago in which a young boy, **Rodney McAllister**, was mauled to death by a pack of stray dogs in the City's Ivory Perry Park. To help alleviate the horrible problem of stray dogs in the City, for many years, the Humane Society of Missouri has served as the City's de facto animal agency, consistently handling 5,000 to 7,000 stray animals per year at our St. Louis City headquarters, spending, at no cost to the City, in excess of \$1 million a year. In the past decade we also have conducted an aggressive spay/neuter program that had begun to reduce the number of stray animals received by our shelters.

Unfortunately, in June 2010, St. Louis City stopped receiving stray and unwanted animals at their Gasconade animal control facility. Almost immediately, the Humane Society of Missouri (HSMO), and the Animal Protective Association (APA), experienced dramatic increases, 38% for the HSMO alone, in the number of stray animals from St. Louis City received by our shelters as demonstrated in a study conducted by the Washington University Olin School of Business.


That, and a 30% increase in calls since June 2010 to our Animal Cruelty Task Force reporting City animals in jeopardy, prompted HSMO and the APA to send a letter in March to St. Louis City **Mayor Francis Slay** conveying our experience

that the City's stray animal problem is getting worse and expressing our grave concern for the safety and welfare of St. Louis citizens and their pets.

We have urged the City strongly to consider a merger of its animal control function with St. Louis County as soon as the new County facility opens this summer.

In addition, we are very pleased to announce the launch of a significant new spay/neuter effort – **Operation City SNIP**. Beginning this month, the Humane Society of Missouri will provide free spay/neuter surgery to pet owners residing in the City of St. Louis. We know spay/neuter is the ultimate solution to pet overpopulation and encourage City pet owners to take advantage of this new service.

Our primary and continuing concern is for the health and welfare of Missourians and their pets. We will continue to provide services for abused, neglected and abandoned pets and work to solve the pet overpopulation problem. We appreciate your continued support of our mission.



Rescue Update from the Animal Cruelty Task Force



Dogs Outside In Freezing Temperatures – Bates County

On Jan. 31, during the most brutal winter Missouri has seen in years, a dozen dogs penned up outdoors were spared certain death by the arrival of the Humane Society of Missouri.

Including the 12 dogs outside, the Animal Cruelty Task Force (ACT) rescued a total of 50 dogs and cats and one mourning dove from a hoarder in Bates County.

"The dogs outside the residence had no shelter; only ice and snow-covered ground, frozen water and no food," said **Jeff McRoy**, statewide investigator. More snow was falling on them as the rescue began. "It was unlikely these animals could survive another day without help."

Inside each of the hoarder's three dilapidated houses, ACT rescuers waded through piles of trash along with feces and urine-soaked floors. "The stench was so strong we smelled it from outside," said McRoy.

Filthy Dogs Find Clean Home at HSMO – Carthage

Earlier in January, the Missouri Department of Agriculture (MDA) revoked the license of a Carthage, Mo. breeder as a result of violations. The MDA asked the Humane Society of Missouri to remove and shelter 34 small dogs crammed in wire cages without evidence of food or water.

When the rescuers arrived on January 14, they found dogs in stacked, wire-bottom cages with feces piled as much as seven inches deep under the bottom cages. Rescuers found no available water or visible food for the Shih Tzus, Pekingese, Silkies and Maltese dogs. Their coats were heavily matted with feces and urine and the dogs appeared to be suffering from dehydration, dental disease and respiratory and skin infections.

In the care of the Humane Society of Missouri, the animals now have nutritious food, fresh water and veterinary attention.

Breeder's License Revoked on the Spot - Dallas County

It did not take long for officials from the Missouri Department of Agriculture (MDA) to determine that the lives of 74 dogs and puppies were in immediate jeopardy. The thin bodies of the Collies and Bichon Frises were covered with mud, feces and urine. Numerous violations of the Animal Care and Facilities Act prompted MDA offocials to revoke the Dallas County breeder's license immediately.

Not surprisingly, several animals were sick and listless. Fearing the weakest were close to death, the MDA obtained a warrant for their removal. At its request, the Humane Society of Missouri Animal Cruelty Task Force (ACT) brought them to safety at its St. Louis City headquarters on February 18.

"We applaud the MDA for its quick action," said **Kathy Warnick**, president of the Humane Society. "Undoubtedly the lives of the weakest ones were saved. If this heart-sickening cruelty had continued, other deaths would have been inevitable."

The Humane Society provided immediate veterinary care for all 74 severely neglected animals, not to mention the indispensable TLC always available from HSMO staff and volunteers.

The King family wanted a Cockapoo (cross between Cocker Spaniel and Poodle). As supporters of the Humane Society, the pet-loving family limited their search to rescued dogs.

"We registered online for a specific breed," said **Marifran King**. "We had to be patient. So many times we'd be notified about Cockapoos but they'd be gone by the time we got to the adoption center."

In September, the family's wish came true when they arrived in time to meet Cockapoo puppy Sarah. She had been rescued from an unlicensed breeder and had been living in a cage with urinesoaked bedding, no visible food and algae in her water bowl.

"I picked Sarah up for a cuddle and never let her go," she said. Husband **Dan** and children **Chelsea** and **Dash** agree with Marifran that Sarah brings joy and blessings. The Kings say Sarah is funny, cute, loving, smart and spunky. And still loves to cuddle

Wink, a Maltese born with only one eye, also was rescued from a substandard breeder and adopted by the Kings about a year ago. "She looks like a little stuffed animal missing a button eye," laughed Marifran.





'Dog People' Might Need a Cat If...


... they no longer have the time, space or energy to take care of a dog.

Why a cat? Because they are cuddly, purry pets you don't have to walk!

Contrary to the myth, cats are loving companions and enjoy human company. They are content in all kinds of spaces including apartments. And, if you need to leave for several hours, you won't have to rush home for potty duty. Cats never have to be walked or taken outside for any reason.

Like dogs, cats have a wide range of sizes, coat characteristics and personality traits. If you have a certain temperament in mind, choose a cat more than six months old. An adoption counselor will help with finding the right cat. A word to the wise for first-time adopters: "You can't own a cat. The best you can do is be partners." — Sir Harry Swanson

Get detailed information and answers to the most frequent cat questions at hsmo.org. Click on "Train Your Pet" and scroll down to the Cats section.



- Cats get along with other pets. Depending on the temperament of the animals, introduction could take up to three weeks.
- Strategic scratching behind the ears or under the chin revs up the purr engine.
- A cat knows its name and can be trained to come by rewarding with cat treats.
- If your cat hides and then runs out and pounces on you, she is playfully acting out her instinctive hunting ritual.
- When a cat fluffs out its tail, it is to appear larger and scare off whatever is frightening it (also used in play).
- Cats use a variety of meows to communicate with their owners.

Cats need:

- ✓ Comfy place for sleeping
- ✓ Play time and lap time
- ✓ Private place for litter box
- ✓ Scratching post
- ✓ Quality food and fresh water, well separated from the litter box
- ✓ Regular vaccinations and health check-ups

Cats don't need:


- ✓ Rough handling
- ✓ People food
- ✓ Too many treats
- ✓ To be outside (a cat kept indoors can live 18 years or more)
