Our Largest Rescue of the Year: Your Support Saved the Lives of 63 Puppies and Dogs Found in a Desperate Situation

When it comes to large-scale rescues, it takes planning and preparation. It also takes resources to bring dozens of dogs to safety, to address their immediate medical needs and to provide comfort and care throughout the healing process. In early June your support made it possible to rescue 63 Yorkshire Terriers, yorkie mixes and other small breeds from a hoarding situation in Franklin County. This is the largest rescue we have had this year.

The animals ranged in age from newborn puppies to senior dogs. The dogs were all living in squalor and were frightened, filthy, and infested with parasites. The property was unsafe, showing serious signs of structural decay. A concerned citizen raised the red flag, and our Animal Cruelty Task Force (ACT) responded immediately.

They were able to bring the dogs back to the Humane Society of Missouri's headquarters in St. Louis City the same day for triage. Many of the dogs had never been to a vet. Your support made it possible to give all of them state-of-the-art veterinary treatment, including medicines, dental care, healthy diets, life-saving procedures and spay/neuter surgeries.

The dogs continued to receive care and attention from shelter staff, until they were ready to become part of a family and forever home. Second chances for 63 pups! It is something we can all look at with pride!

Benton County Rescue Update: It's A Girl! And Another Girl! Fillies are Flourishing at Longmeadow, Thanks to Your Love and Support!

When six starving mares were rescued and brought to Longmeadow Rescue Ranch, it was not clear if they would recover from their neglect. They were severely underweight, extremely malnourished and host to a variety of internal and external parasites. And even more worrisome: two of the mares were pregnant. Would their foals survive?

From the start, because of our generous supporters, the team at Longmeadow Rescue Ranch was able to commit to their costly and lengthy care. The team knew they could take extreme measures to bring Hermès and Fendi to a healthy weight and support their pregnancies. The mares were put on a diet of special grain and alfalfa hay that provided the extra nutrition they needed. Staff members spent hours removing cockleburs from their manes, tails, and coats, administering vaccines, deworming & lice treatments, hoof trims, and everything else needed to give Hermès and Fendi a fighting chance.

On April 30th, Hermès gave birth to her filly, affectionately named "Prada." Prada was standing less than an hour after she was born and nursing within two. Fendi went into labor on May 17th and gave birth to her filly, Chanel, that evening. Despite giving birth to a healthy baby, Fendi displayed symptoms of an uncommon phenomenon called 'Foal Rejection' and wanted nothing to do with the baby, refusing to nurse or bond with the newly birthed Chanel.





It was essential that Chanel be separated from her mother, for the health and safety of them both. Longmeadow staff were able to begin milking Fendi shortly after the birth, ensuring Chanel was given the colostrum, or first milk, essential for the health of newborns. Young Chanel is happy and healthy, but has essentially become an orphaned foal, completely dependent upon the round-the-clock care of the Longmeadow staff instead of her mother.

Despite the challenges presented to our Longmeadow staff, we are fully committed to supporting these fillies until they are ready for adoption. Your continued support means we will care for these horses, no matter how long it takes.

This kind of love and care is only possible because of you. Thank you for being there for Prada, Chanel and all the other animals at Longmeadow Rescue Ranch.

Fredrick's New Leash on Life

Who says you can't teach an old dog new tricks? Fredrick came to us as a stray, limping and suffering from severe periodontal disease. This 9-year-old dog barely weighed 10 pounds and didn't belong on the street.

At HSMO, Fredrick finally experienced the safety and care he deserved. He was neutered, received routine vaccinations, and was given a full dental workup. His future was looking bright! But soon after arrival he developed a hernia and lingering respiratory infection. It would take several weeks of uncertainty and care before he recovered. Luckily, he caught the eye of staff and was taken on as an in-office foster. Little did Fredrick know; this was the first step in finding a perfect home.

Fredrick's friends at HSMO were determined to see him thrive. They began laying the groundwork by sending his photos to a potential adopter. Finally, a meet-and-greet was arranged. It was love at first sight, and his new family took him home the same day! Now Fredrick has a new leash on life. His adopter has years of animal handling experience and prepares soft foods for him daily. Thanks to your support, this distinguished elder dog will never face hardship again.

Rock on, Noomi!

Our supporters are rock stars, giving second chances to the thousands of animals we serve. Animals like Noomi, who was rescued from a hoarding situation by our Animal Cruelty Task Force. She was found with *eight puppies*, cowering on the floorboard of a dilapidated vehicle. They had been living in unsanitary, inhumane conditions without fresh food or clean water. It was clear they had never been seen by a veterinarian and were understandably wary of humans.

Our team transported the family, **along with 33 other dogs**, to our headquarters for compassionate care. Noomi would need routine treatments like deworming and vaccinations, but grooming was vital for this poodle mix. Her hair was so matted that she lost pounds of weight after shaving.

Noomi cleaned up nicely and turned out to be quite the showstopper! She moved into a foster home with the puppies until they could be weaned. Her babies were finally placed for adoption while mom patiently waited for her turn.

Thanks to you, Noomi was able to take the time needed to recover and find a great home. After months of care, she was adopted by a loving, forever family. Now she lives the good life and has the best hairdo in town!

Odie's Dog Days are Over


Odie's story is proof that incredible things happen thanks to your support! He


