Increased Costs

Our Animal Cruelty Task Force (ACT) remains our first line of defense in stopping animal abuse and neglect. With the increase in demand, the cost of operating our ACT increased sharply. More investigations and rescue efforts meant more miles driven in 2024 and the need to replace or maintain vehicles and equipment became critical.

Staffing our shelters remains challenging as the cost of recruiting, training and retaining quality animal care teams continues to increase year over year. As the number of animals we care for rises each year, so does the need to have a talented, mission-focused team that can devote itself to the rehabilitation and care each animal needs to be able to find the second chance it deserves.

The decline in the number of adoptions at our Longmeadow Rescue Ranch saw a sharp increase in the cost of caring for our horses and other animals as their length of stay with us often goes from weeks to months.

Increase in Demand Fuels Need for Expansion

The year-over-year increase in the number of animals we rescue and rehome has created the need for us to expand our shelter space. In 2025, we will begin a construction project at our Best Buddy Center in Maryland Heights that will add space for up to 40 additional animals, including space for 20 large breed dogs. There will also be expansions of our laundry and other facilities to accommodate our increase in capacity. This project will begin in the spring, take several months and will cost an estimated \$5.5 million.

Increased Need

The utilization of our programs and the number of animals that we rescued increased in 2024 over 2023. Moreover, the number of calls to our animal abuse hotline increased, along with the number of reports made through our website or via direct message on social media. We responded to each and every one of these nearly 20,000 reports of abuse, neglect and abandonment throughout the state. Within the first few weeks of last year. our Animal Cruelty Task Force rescued 97 Labrador Retrievers from the facility of an unlicensed breeder in Phelps County and 55 dogs from a property in Stone County. In the fall we rescued 15 horses within St. Louis County. While we saw an increase in the number of shelter adoptions, horse and other ranch adoptions fell well short of our goals.



Second Chances



With your support, we provide second chances to thousands of animals every year. Here are just a few of the 2024 milestones and miracles.

Phelps County Lab Rescue

There are arguably few things cuter than a Lab puppy. Our donors agree. They responded in horror, relief and generosity as the fate of 97 Labrador retrievers unfolded. In January, our Animal Cruelty Task Force was called to Phelps County, Missouri. We have been to this property before, having removed 83 dogs from this unlicensed breeder who is included on the national



"Horrible 100" list—a ranking of the worst dog breeders in the country in 2019. This time, 97 dogs—many of them puppies needed immediate help.

Our ACT team found large dogs kept in small, cramped wire crates without consistent access to water. There were no resting surfaces for puppies to lie on and no evidence of veterinary care. Our donors responded with open hearts.

When the animals arrived at our headquarters, each dog received veterinary care and bundles of love from our dedicated team of staff and volunteers. Many of the pups needed dental work, while others were treated for sores on their paws from standing on the wire bottoms of their crates for countless days. None had ever walked on a leash or played with a human companion.



Despite what they had been through, the Labs understood that we were there to help. They greeted the rescue team with wagging tails and hopeful spirits.

Healthy pups were spayed/ neutered and made available for adoption quickly. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, all of the dogs found loving, forever homes.

Mario the Kitten

Two college students were about start the car when they heard a faint meowing. They discovered there was a tiny kitten in the engine of the car, too scared to move. They spent hours trying to coax the kitten out of the innerworkings of the car and eventually lured him out with treats. Mario was filthy and scared but warmed up quickly to his rescuers. They gave him a bath, food and a cozy place to sleep. The next day, they brought him to HSMO. Mario was given the medical attention and care he needed and found his forever family shortly after! Your support helps us give animals like Mario the second chance they deserve!



Sally and Sanchez

In January, Sally and Sanchez were rescued from a property in Stone County. The temperature was 12 degrees, and they had no shelter. They were both bone thin and needed emergency medical treatment. Our Animal Cruelty Task Force rushed them to the shelter, where they got warm and were put on a feeding schedule to slowly gain weight.

As they gained weight, their tails started to wag. They loved to spend time with their human friends and enjoyed going for walks when they were healthy enough to do so.

By mid-March, Sanchez had nearly doubled in weight and was ready to be adopted. When his family met him, they knew right away that he had found his forever home.

Sally battled some digestive issues and had to wait a little longer to meet her forever family. But when they came along, she was all smiles and wags on her way out the door. Thanks to our donors, these two pups are in loving, forever homes.



Gabriel the Coonhound

In May, the HSMO's Animal Cruelty Task Force rescued 22 malnourished Coonhounds from an unlicensed breeder in Gasconade County. They were experiencing a range of conditions from wounds to respiratory issues. Thanks to donors like you, we were able to treat them and give them the loving care they deserve.

Though several of the dogs found their forever families, it took a little longer for pups like Gabriel. Gabriel had open wounds, ticks in his ears, and battled respiratory issues. He was hesitant to accept love and attention from humans but warmed up over time working with our behavior team.

When the time came to go to his forever home, Gabriel was all smiles and wags on his way out the door!



Suri

Suri's story is one that spans nearly seven years. This beautiful quarter horse initially came to Longmeadow Rescue Ranch in 2017 and was adopted shortly after her arrival. Unfortunately, her adopter didn't have the time to care for her, so she returned to the ranch shortly after.

Longmeadow's trainer Courtney knew Suri was something special. She saw Suri's potential and knew she would need to find the perfect home with an owner who understood how Suri operated both under saddle and on the ground.

> Enter Allison. Allison had been volunteering at Longmeadow for a while and had grown up riding horses. When her Thoroughbred lost his companion, she began looking for a horse to keep him company. She and Courtney arranged a few meet-andgreets with Longmeadow horses, and when Allison met Suri, it was

clear it was a match made in heaven.

Suri went to her forever home in August and is fitting in perfectly with Allison's family. Thanks to the generosity of donors like you, we are able to give horses like Suri the second chance they deserve — no matter how long it takes!

Animal Rescue, Rehabilitation and Adoption

Shelter Veterinary Medicine Program


HSMO ensures that animals that are abused and/or neglected are rescued and quickly placed into the care of our professional veterinary, behavior and shelter staff. Two full-time, experienced shelter veterinarians examine and treat every animal that comes to our shelters. Having seen the worst-of-the-worst cases of animal abuse and neglect, they are able to quickly diagnose medical trauma, parasitic conditions and malnutrition, and create a treatment

malnutrition, and create a treatment plan unique to each animal's specific needs. Then, veterinary technicians and animal care staff conduct the treatment plans for the hundreds of animals recuperating in our shelters.



Animal Cruelty Task Force

The Humane Society of Missouri's Animal Cruelty Task Force (ACT) is on call 24/7/365 to rescue animals in distress and transport sick and/or injured stray animals to the shelters. Our statewide Animal Cruelty Investigators provide a safety net for animals in areas where little or no local animal care and control exists. We operate in all 114 Missouri counties and in any given year travel more than 300,000 miles responding to reports of abuse and neglect. We are one of the largest animal rescue and disaster response teams in the United States. For nearly five decades, we have cultivated relationships with law enforcement, social services and animal welfare agencies through the state, as well as nationally, so we can be there when animals need us. We are committed to leaving no animal in a life-threating situation.





Shelter Behavior and Foster Services

Understandably, dogs, cats and other animals rescued from horrible situations may exhibit behaviors that could prevent them from successfully moving to a new home. HSMO's shelter behavior and foster program teams evaluate and work with individual dogs and cats to help improve undesirable behaviors like fearfulness, resource guarding and more. Foster program staff collaborate with volunteer foster parents to introduce home life to pets that have never experienced living with a family. Foster parents are also called upon to help raise and socialize puppies and kittens until they are old enough to place in their forever homes.

Humane Education

In 2024, we were thrilled to offer our full curriculum of classes and events once again to children and adults. HSMO has always been committed to educating the community, especially children, about care and respect for all living creatures. With the support of education-minded donors, dedicated volunteer docents and an experienced staff, HSMO's education program reaches thousands of people every year through programs in schools,

Longmeadow Rescue Ranch

Horses and farm animals often need the rescue, rehabilitation and adoption services of the Humane Society of Missouri, and they can find this at our Longmeadow Rescue Ranch. Situated on 165 acres outside Union, Missouri, each year the staff at Longmeadow care for abused, abandoned and neglected animals and offer classes and education programs about caring for horses and farm animals. Thanks to caring friends like you, Longmeadow continues to be a haven for horses, goats, chickens, pigs, ducks and other farm animals. It is one of the largest and most comprehensive horse and farm animal care and rehabilitation centers in the country.


Operation SNIP Keeps Us Safe

Since its inception, Operation SNIP has provided tens of thousands of low-cost spay/neuter surgeries to animals in the St. Louis region. This effort has prevented an estimated 10 million stray animals from overwhelming our shelters while ensuring longer, healthier lives for the animals who have been spayed/neutered. In 2024, the cost of supplies for operation SNIP surgeries increased six-fold, and the support we need to continue this program into the future is critical to the ongoing health and well-being of animals throughout our region.
